Word also came of the death of a son of Poke Run Church, The Rev. Arthur C. Walter, of Beaver, Pa., on June 20, 1980. He was born at Mamont, November 8, 1905, graduated from Washington Township High School, Grove City College and Western Theological Seminary. He was ordained into the ministry in 1931 and installed as pastor of the Boulevard Church, Columbus, Ohio, where he remained until 1942, when he took leave from the ministry to become a chaplain in the Air Force. Following World War II he continued as Chaplain in the Reserves, until 1965 holding the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. His pastorates included First Presbyterian Church in Hubbard, Ohio, Longs Run Presbyterian in Calcutta, Ohio, and First Presbyterian of Beaver, Pennsylvania, where he served as assistant pastor for a number of years. In 1968 he resigned from the ministryddue to ill health. Mr. Walter was married to Marguerite Maddox of Columbus, Ohio, in 1938, and to them were born three children, Margaret Ann, David Arthur and John Calvin. Mr. Brice, reflecting back to college days, remembers Arthur C. Walter as the returning alumnus with radiant and outgoing personality, and posessing those attitudes of faith and traits of Christian character, so characteristic of those who are promised eternal dwelling with the Master, in the Father's House. Confirmed in this trust may the members of the family of Arthur C. Walter be encouraged and comforted; and may all who have in recent weeks lost loved ones be guided and sustained by the promised ministeries of the Holy Spirit.

This letter -- combining both fond remembrances and wistful hopefulness -- is being sent to all, in trust that all will in some measure share the depth of meaning gathered about the fact that in the providence of God I am very likely for the last time as Pastor of Poke Run Church inviting the congregation to share in World Communion."

On July 2, 1980, fire destroyed a local landmark, a large barn on the Ella McCullough farm in Bell Township. The structure, 86 by 136 by 90 feet, was considered one of the oldest and largest of its kind in the East. It was built at the turn of the century by Jake Hines and was thereafter known far and wide as "The Hines Barn". Featured in a Pittsburgh magazine story a few years ago, it embodied craftmanship no longer available. The foundation was cut stone and its mortis and tendon joint structure enabled it to "give" in high winds. It had a slate roof, huge hand-hewn beams and two silos. 


