## I NEVER COULD HAVE PLANNED IT --

Labor Day --Monday, September 7, 1981

I had previously indicated my intention of attempting through the September issue of THE RANGER to spread abroad my deep appreciation to one and all of the thoughtful and kind persons who helped to make the concluding period of my pastorate such a wonderful experience. To the Session, to the Board of Deacons, to the Board of Trustees, to the committees, to the photographers, to the groups and organizations, to the membership at large, to the friends of the congregation, to the Poke Run community, to the Union Church, to the Glade Run, Bethesda and Claysville Churches, to those related to me through family and fraternal ties, to the Dayton Fair Association, to Moderator William R. Johnston, to the Presbytery of Redstone, and to all other friends and organizational groups both near at hand and far away I convey my deep gratitude and appreciation. Above all, in prayerful temper of mind "we give thanks to God and the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ." (Colossians 1:3). Without His help, without the love of Christ, and without the unfailing guidance of the Holy Spirit these wonderful things could not have been. I am certain that "I never could have planned it"; and, to this day, I do not know exactly how it all came about; and, for this reason among others, I find it quite impossible to personally thank each person who participated.

Readers of THE RANGER, I hope you are capable of emotional sensitivity. Otherwise, this attempt to convey thanks will leave you disappointed, perhaps even a little confused. Now get on board for the somewhat jerky emotional journey. We are going to be seated on folding chairs. Emphathy is an essential for this journey. Take your deck chair and be seated close to me. Throw sentence structure to the winds, and punctuate according to your own tastes.

Knowing of my intent to express appreciation through the September issue of THE RANGER, our faithful Narrative Writer (Mrs. W. Blair Kiebler), talked with me about having my expression of thanks placed near the beginning of the September issue. I gladly agreed to this. However, I have long since discovered that agreeing to do something is one thing; but being able to adequately fulfill an agreement is often quite another thing. At best, this will be only an attempt to have others share with me the emotions and inexpressible joys I have been experiencing -- emotions and joys initiated by others. To repeat, I never could have planned it; and how can one by mere words, however sincere, express sufficient thankfulness for the well planned, generous, and appropriate deeds of kindness with which I have been showered during the closing period of my pastorate at the Poke Run Presbyterian Church? If you are wondering -- you did by lavish words, through kind deeds, and by generous substance surprise and almost overwhelm me; and yet I should have known and perhaps even to have expected you to be characteristically faithful amidst this lovingly planned severing circumstance in our long and close relationship.

In preparing to record release of my feeling help came. It was on Monday, August 31st -- the last official day of my pastorate. The routine of getting up, with preliminary associated activities had been completed. Morning devotions, with more than usual significance, were over. Breakfast was over, and other personal necessities were in the background. Additional activities of the morning included: time on the telephone, preparation of a letter, a call from Edgar Brewer, a trip to the mail box, and use of the copier at the Church Office.


I was on my way down from the Church Office at approximately 10:45 A. M., bearing on bracketed arms the beautiful paintings, the encased needle work, the pillow, and the other precious articles -- in all numbering approximately ten separate items, with an unopened 'Totes' umbrella perched on top. How does one manage while carrying such a precious cargo when the top item, the umbrella, gets out of balance and begins

to slide? Let the umbrella go, of course; and it did go; but to my amazement in the process of sliding earthward the curved handle end of the umbrella hooked right over my right arm. "I never could have planned it!" -- was my immediate thought; and I am sure that that immediate thought had been immediately preceded by a Spirit-prompted prayer of petition and immediately followed by a Spirit-prompted prayer of thanks-giving. I am convinced that there is that Spirit-prompted type of devotion which is initiated by God, including that type of devotion which the Apsotle Paul refers to in Romans 12:12 as "continuing instant in prayer." Most certainly, I never could have planned it!

In a larger sense I never could have planned all of the wonderful things the congregation of Poke Run Church, the friends of Poke Run Church, and the many other friends have done for me not only recently but throughout the years. In a still larger sense I never could have planned the wonderful things God and His people have done for me during my total active ministry and throughout my whole life; and in a still even larger sense all of us together really could not have planned it all or put in all together by ourselves. So, perhaps the best way for all of us to express our thanks is for all of us to join with the Psalmist to "praise the Lord for His goodness, and for His wonderful works to the children of men!" (Psalm 107:8).

By now you have probably detected that I have been more or less confirming my theological view of human events. I hope so; and, if so, my efforts have met with some success.

And then it was on Tuesday, September 1st — the first official day of my retirement from the active pastorate of Poke Run Church — that I brought the quilt to the Manse. On the evening before persons of the congregation had so helpfully taken it down from the north wall of the Sanctuary where it had been on display during the month of August. It had been neatly folded and placed in the Church Office. I had in customary fashion gone to the Church Office by way of the West Door. Seeing again the heart warming words which remained on the cork board at the entrance to the Library in Fellowship Hall welled my emotions. Let me share these words with you, the reader. Their appearance on the cork board was very much as immediately below.



The impact of these words again caused me to be overcome by a sense of sincere mutuality of feeling and humble gratitude. I continued on to the Church Office, there to find the beautiful quilt neatly folded as had been planned; and I pensively bore away this symbol of love, prepared by many hands, requiring hundreds of hours of planning and labor. As I made my way to the Manse with it, thoughts of great joy filled my mind and floods of joy came to my eyes.

## Not Exactly To Myself, And Not Alone

As I walked I talked a little, yet not exactly to myself.

There I talked a little as I walked, yet not exactly to myself -and not alone.

On Poke Run Hill I walked and talked!
On September 1, 1981 on Poke Run Hill I walked, yet not alone;
I talked a little, yet not exactly to
myself -- retired, yet not retired.

In quick succession, I had thoughts of Moses in the mountain of Nebo, at the top of Pisgah -- with eye undim, nor natural force abated -- obedient still, beholding by faith and inward vision 'hopes's true Promised Land';

And words of our Lord came to me with note of fresh command -somehow just for me, and for thee: "These
things I have spoken unto you, that my joy
might remain in you, and that your joy
might be full." (John 15:11)

Now Lord, we must be obedient and get on with your work and mission through this and future issues of THE RANGER. Please just add your blessing to my attempt to convey thanks to your people.

While I never could have planned it, it has all come to pass; and perhaps all of us ought to pause and join in singing the Doxology; but may I be forgiven for just one more thought--I hope a joyous one for all -- for all who have such close ties with Poke Run Church.

Thanks is what I am still trying to say; and somehow it cannot be adequately said unless we all say it together, and unless it be addressed to the One from whom all our blessings flow.

Now please use your imagination --knowing that in some very real yet invisible way I hope to continue to be present at the worship services of Poke Run Church, perhaps standing there at the side of The Communion Table, joining with the congregation in singing the Doxology at the time the tithes and offerings are being brought forward; and it will make me very happy to see the Sanctuary filled to overflowing from Sunday to Sunday -- just like it was on the morning of Sunday, July 26, 1981.

Praise God from whom all blessings flow;
Praise Him, all creatures here below;
Praise Him above, ye heavenly host:
Praise Father, Son, and Holy Ghost. Amen."

We shall be looking forward to further messages from Mr. Brice as he enjoys his retirement days in the old Brice homestead in the Dayton area.

Since the last Ranger was sent out several important events took place at Poke Run. On July 21st, 1981, Mr. Brice was host to approximately forty members and their families from his Presbytery Support Group at a dinner in Fellowship Hall. The Women's Association Dinner Committee made all the necessary arrangements for this happy occasion.

Then came July 26th, 1981, Reverend Brice's last Sunday as Pastor of Poke Run Church, when his sermon topic was, appropriately enough, "The Benediction". The church was filled to overflowing. As it was also Baptismal Sunday, he administered the sacrament of baptism to two babies at the service. Mrs. James Z. Zimmerman presided at the organ and Valerie Jean Striner at the piano. Rick Learn, Poke Run music director, had written a special arrangement of one of Mr. Brice's favorite hymns, "How Great Thou Art", which was sung by the choir. It was indeed a memorable occasion, spiritual and nostalgic.

Following the service, an Open House was held in Fellowship Hall with approximately 325 guests attending, hosted by the Deacons. The beautiful quilt, in which so many of you Ranger readers shared, was presented to Mr. Brice at this time by the members of Circle 2.

Then on Friday, July 31, 1981, Reverend Brice was honored at a dinner in The Lamplighter Restaurant at Delmont by 215 friends and relatives. At the speaker's table with Mr. Brice were his sister-in-law Mrs. Pauline Brice, Dr. and Mrs. William M. Aber (Executive Presbyter of Redstone Presbytery), Dr. and Mrs. William R. Johnston (present Moderator of Poke Run Church), Mr. and Mrs. Ivan D. Dormire (former Sunday School Teacher of Mr. Brice at Glade Run Church), and Mr. and Mrs. Donald P. Lengauer. As Toastmaster, Don Lengauer made the welcoming remarks and introduced the following speakers - Dr. Aber, Dr. Johnston, Mr. Dormire, Francis M. Cain, Jr., a former member, Barb Thompson, president of Youth Fellowship, and Gerald Christy, representing the Mrs. James W. Dunmire, president of The Women's Association made the presentation of the following gifts to the guest-of-honor on behalf of the congregation, family and friends: three original paintings of the church, the manse, and the academy building by our talented member- artist, Pat McElroy Lengauer -- and a billfold with a check for \$3400.00.
