FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK:

OUR COMMON MINISTRY

There has been much discussion in church circles about recovering the "ministry of the laity". For Presbyterians this should not be thought of as something new. Our form of church government depends upon the active involvement of lay people in the ministry and governing of the church. The leaders of the Reformation stressed the doctrine of the "priesthood of all believers" emphasizing that all members of the church were called to share a common ministry. The role of Pastors was to assist the congregation by providing guidance and direction so that church members could carry out their individual and collective ministries. The Pastor was not to be seen as the minister, but as a minister with a special function within a community of ministers. This is why our worship bulletins describe Poke Run Presbyterian Church as: "A people called to minister in Christ's name to our community and our world." and then lists the staff as assistants in that ministry.

As we begin a new year it would be good for us all to reflect upon the meaning of our membership in the Church and to reaffirm our calling to its ministry:



The inflation of the past ten years has further eroded their unds pay not only for food, but tiso

With the assistance of the Benefit Supplement, most retirees are able to live independently. However, when nursing care is required, the cost is beyond the financial reach of many retirees. If a retiree has served the Church for 20 years and personal assets have been depleted to a stipulated level, application may be made for Nursing Home Care Assistance.

Our gifts to the Christmas Offering provide assistance to retired church workers and their families -- people like Evelyn Harper, who for 40 years served with her late husband, Roy Harper, Sr., as missionaries to Brazil. Mrs. Harper is thankful that gifts to the Christmas Offering have given her the opportunity to live at a retirement facility with other retired mission workers. "There is such fine fellowship here. I can't describe how wonderful it is to be able to be here.'

AFRICAN CRISIS UPDATE

The Presbyterian Hunger Program staff has covenanted that 100% of all money contributed to direct food relief in Africa will be sent, with no deduction of administrative costs. Time and overhead will be donated by the staff and volunteers. The food purchased will be distributed by church agencies.

The \$45 million recently released by the Administration to African relief depletes Africa relief funds through September, 1985. Individuals and Sessions should write to the State Department requesting that AID funds should be transferred into the Africa Disaster Assistance Fund, and that these funds pay not only for food, but also for transportation. 

UPDATE ON BICENTENNIAL PLANS

The Board of Trustees has had a very busy year, carrying out some of the improvements endorsed by the congregation in preparation for the 200th Anniversary.

All exterior wood trim on the Church building was painted this summer. The slate roof and the Educational Building roof were checked and repaired and the ridge combs and gutters painted.

Downstairs in the Educational Building, all plaster was removed to a height of 3½ or 4 feet on deteriorated wall areas. These places were then cemented and the walls painted. Radiator covers were painted, also. At the same time other bad plaster and holes in the building were patched.

A new roof was put on the overhang on the West entrance of the Educational Building and also on the overhang on the left front Sanctuary exit.

In the Church office a new typewriter was purchased, new cabinets and table were placed and the office rearranged to make a roomier, more efficient work place.

A new Hoover vacuum cleaner was purchased this summer with money from the Current Fund.

Repairs were made to the driveway and handicapped parking spaces were laid out in front of the Academy building. The Academy roof was repaired and painted. Recently cleanup was begun inside the building in preparation for repairs and painting during the next few months.

Also planned for the beginning of 1985 are furnace improvements in the Church and the installation of three ceiling fans in the Sanctuary.

Before our anniversary celebration, much remains to be done. A new floor will be installed in the downstairs of the Educational building. The upstairs tile will be stripped and renewed. Hallways & Church school rooms need painted. Storage must be built in the room next to the Church kitchen. Hopefully, restoration will be made to the Academy to the point that it will be a respectable part of our celebration.

However, funds are not available at this time to complete all of these projects. Time is short. The Trustees need to know how much money we will have in order to schedule work on the remaining repairs.
