WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY . . . October 7, 1984

The first Sunday has been traditonally observed as a day when Christians of all denominations and from every nation gather at the Lord's Table to celebrate that in Christ, despite all our differences we are one people, and that "The Tie that Binds our Hearts in Christian Love" as brothers and sisters in the Lord has a stronger claim on our lives than the divisive, often hostile, claims of Nation, Race, or even Political Philosophy. "For Christ himself has brought us peace, by making Jews and Gentiles one people. With his own body he broke down the wall that separated them and kept them enemies. "(Ephesians 2:14)

Because we as the Body of Christ are called to continue to carry out in our lives our Lord's Mission of making peace, our General Assembly has designated this day to be a celebration of PEACEMAKING. A special offering will be received for the PRESBYTERIAN PEACEMAKING PROGRAM. (Envelope enclosed)

REFORMATION SUNDAY . . . October 28, 1984

. . . November 4, 1984 ALL SAINTS

These two celebrations are somewhat related, since they both recall the rich heritage of the Christian faith. They are both times to recall the examples of the many faithful persons who have offered their lives to Christ's service, often at great percenal cost. The celebration of the Reformation is a time for recalling the stand taken by those in our tradition in order to preseve the truth of the gospel within a church that had swerved off course. The celebration of All Saints recalls our common heritage with the faithful of all times and places, who share with us the one calling we received through our baptism into Christ. On this day we celebrate the sacrament of Baptism and have a special remembrance of the members of Poke Run who have died in the past year as we celebrate our "mystic sweet communion with those : whose rest is won" at the Lord's Table.

POSTCARDS FOR PEACE



Having been inspired by God, the Presbytery of Lake Huron submitted a resolution-overture, which was passed by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) calling for a day of Prayers and "Postcards for Peace" on World Communion Sunday, October 7, 1984. On this day postcards will be written by each worshipper to the President of the United States and the Chairman of the Soviet Union asking them to work together for a just peace Many hundreds of Presbyterian Churches are expected to plan for this day. The Kirkridge Presbyterian Church

prayerfully requests that other faiths join us in the world wide gathering of God's children. We also encourage others to help us spread the word to other ares. Many have already accepted this plan warmly. With your help and others like you, we see that this would be a gathering for God with prayers for peace by all people, at one time, and each card a vote for peace. This could have a tremendous effect on leaders of our earth.



THE PONY EXPRESS IS COMING AGAIN TO OUR CHURCH!

The highly successful stewardship program officially starts its second visit Sunday, October 21, 1984, when the Pony Express "Run" gets under way.

Timelines and procedures will be the same as a year ago, but there will be new and exciting posters, bulletin inserts, reminder cards and stewardship letters.

The PX plan is styled after the famous Pony Express mail relay system of more than a century ago. It relies heavily on teamwork.

Many of our members have commented about the fun they had participating in the "Run" last year. Because of our experience, we have decided to again rely on the PX saddlebag relay to raise our budget.

Glenn Ross will be "general manager" of the campaign. Helping Glenn on the PX coordinating committee are Ed Sharer "assistant general manager"; Ruth Ryman, Church School coordinator; Mary Krusey with Shyrl Stange assisting as Mail Clerks; and Calvin McCutcheon as Publicity agent. Glenn will provide guidance to six "station agents", who will each supervise five "trail bosses".

Each trail boss will again oversee a neighborhood PX "route" composed of ten families. Each family will be asked to be a "route rider", relaying a stewardship "saddlebag" to a nearby family. Sanotal the contract

The saddlebag will again contain "estimate of giving" cards. You will be asked to fill in a card, seal it in an opaque envelope, insert the envelope in the saddlebag, and hand-carry the bag to the next family on the route list attached to the bag strap.

Many members have said they were pleased that their decision about financia support of the church was made in the privacy of their home, without a "hard sell" solicitation from the church.

PONTY EXPRESS TO RUN AGA

Seasonal chills are in the air; school buses make their rounds; and with Dorthine Blesch we are aware of -- and perhaps a little inwardly jarred -- by the fact that dark clouds suggestive of autumn have already passed over the meadows. With autumn about to begin, reflections relating to the summer come to the fore.

The summer of 1984 has been for me both busy and meaningful, embracing spiritual experiences in several communities — the most recent focal point being the Poke Run Church Community. In the period August 2-5 I was there three times. These return visits gave rise to reflections on the experiences of former years, experiences charged with mixed emotions — emotions of joy and emotions of sadness. Many were the times when family members and other friends gathered to lend support and to give expression of Christian Faith relating to the going Home of loved ones. At other times many of these same persons assembled for the witness of sacred marriage vows.

Supplying at Poke Run Church on August 5th was a kind of full-cycle-experience. It was on August 15, 1937 that I first supplied at Poke Run Church — at which time my sermon subject was: "A Blessed Fact" based upon Psalm 24:1.

Evidently predeterminative factors merged on August 15, 1937, leading to arrangements for my being called on November 12, 1944 to Poke Run Pastorate. During the succeeding years I had worked out arrangements for many pulpit supplies; and being back to Poke Run as a supply on August 5th of this year (1984) was a kind of a completion of the cycle. Preparations for being there and being there involved both un-learning and learning.

Permanency seems to be closely related to the realities of the unseen world. Although so many who journeyed with us have gone, the reality of their unseen presence seems to wondrously abide. "Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfector of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God." (Hebrews 12:1-2)



196TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY of P.C. U.S.A.

At the 196th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A) held in Pheonix, Arizona, in June, Harriet Nelson, an elder in the Napa, California, First Presbyterian Church, was elected Moderator. The Rev. James E. Andrews was elected as the first stated clerk of the reunited church. He had served as General Assembly stated clerk of the former P.C.U.S. since 1973. The Assembly voted to "recognize evangelism as central to its calling", adopting a three-year emphasis on evangelism and church growth, and laying plans for a five-year program at all levels of the church. This action followed the sobering report that, in 1983, church membership decreased by 35,000. However, an "unprecedented amount of money - \$1.2 billion" -had been given to mission work and administration.

Other items of business included: approval of a pension increase for retired employees; action aimed at broadening the number of youth and lay persons involved in worship leadership; continuing support of the Equal Rights Amendment; a call to the U. S. government to end military aid to the Marcos regime in the Phillippines; approval of a comprehensive resolution on Central America; voting down a recommendation that the denomination use a gender -- inclusive lectionary; and a call to congregations to investigate the extent and causes of hunger within their own communities, meeting the immediate needs, and working for legislative and other systemic changes that will help remove the causes of hunger. Keynote speakers urged the Assembly to redouble its efforts for the nuclear freeze, and to use church action to put desparately needed pressure on the South African government to make the changes needed to halt the injustice to the blacks there. The award, given in recognition of the church's work in behalf of Salvadoran refugees, was accepted by its pastor, the Rev. John M. Fife, and its clerk of session, Ms. Susan Parrott. In the presentation the congregation was praised for helping Salvadorans find refuge, for restoring the historic tradition of sanctuary, and "putting the Law of God above human ordinances."

I thought I would write and tell you what is going on. There are six of I thought I would write and tell you what is going on. There are six of us on the Caravan. We went to Camp Lackawana for four days where we had training for learning how to handle teaching situations. From there we went to Philadelphia for ten days. There we did many things. We helped paint a church in Camden, New Jersey. The church was in a rough section of all black people. Needless to say we felt a bit out of place. They were having a Bible School in the church we were painting and the people made us feel welcome. Then we went to a community center and helped the elderly. The next week we worked with the homeless and put on puppet shows for little kids. Working with the homeless was really depressing. They just walked around like zombies. The puppet shows were of puppets who had different handicaps and they are supposed to teach the children that people with handicaps aren't too different from us. The kids love them. The puppets are called "The Kids on the Block". At night we went down to South Street and walked around. You should see some of the people! Everyone is into the punk look with multi-colored hair and wild outfits. It was very interesting to say the least. We stayed at Old Pine Church on Pine Street between 4th and 5th street. On the 21st we left Philadelphia and went to Stroudsburg. Two of the girls went to Mahanoy City where they would run a Bible School. I am in Stroudsburg. Tom Blair is our advisor while we are here. Harold Rosenburger is the minister of the Middle Smithfield Church where we are helping with their Bible School. We lead singing, help with games and crafts, and helped teach different age groups. different age groups.

This has been a wonderful experience for me. I have been exposed to so many different ways of life. It makes me feel thankful for what I've got. We are leaving tomorrow morning at 8:30 a.m. From here we are going back to Camp Lackawana for our debriefing. Sunday at 1:00 p.m. we leave to come home. This month has been very rewarding for me. I just got an idea of how other people live and what their needs are. There's so much to do. I hope that we helped them.




