I had an article for this Ranger ready to go. Just this morning I read a sermon by D. Martyn Lloyd Jones. His topic is prayer and I think it will be far more helpful than what I had in mind. So in what follows, the inspiration is from this sermon and the thoughts inspired by it.

OCTOBER Philippians 4:6-7 – do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which passes all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus.

> One of the first questions to ask of any biblical text – or anything that you are reading or watching or listening to - is "why was this written?". Here it seems clear that Paul is addressing one or more persons who are, well, anxious. Now we all know what anxiety is like, whether it is over small and inconsequential possible or impossible events or whether we have real challenges ahead of us. Anxiety keeps our minds frazzled and our hearts racing far beyond what is healthy or helpful. We all suffer from it, lose sleep because of it, and sometimes lapse into the doldrums through it. Anxiety is not really something I have to define. It is self-explanatory.

> Since we all suffer from anxiety, how do we deal with it? This is what Paul addresses. He says, "...do not be anxious about anything," and he does not leave us here. He knows better. He goes on to say that prayer is the answer. We have all heard this too, and believe it in varying degrees. Some pray with complete faith, some in trepidation, hoping against hope. Now here is where Paul, I believe, becomes truly helpful. He lays out a process that we can all follow and a promise that is guaranteed. The final answer may surprise you.

> First of all Pray. Well, what does he mean by this? What he does not mean is to begin to badger God with all our requests, personal, private, or corporate. Prayer means first of all to come before God, to meet God face to face as it were. It means for a short or a long time to sit quietly in the presence of God, in adoration of God simply as God; nothing more. This will be a time of quiet praise in the presence of the divine power that created you and all that is and came to you in Jesus Christ. This is the One with whom you will spend eternity.

> After a time, you can begin to "let your requests be made known to God." Yes, we are not only invited to ask God for His help and blessing and healing, we are in a sense commanded. Prayer is a gift and a discipline. We have many requests, often too many to list or speak and we have to talk in generalities. Still, God wishes to hear our requests and we bring them within this wrapper of praise and adoration. It is good to pray, it is good to ask. Jesus amplifies this in his few comments on prayer. Come to God, sit in silence and adoration, ask.

> Ask, in a specific way; with thanksgiving. This is not always easy. Life does not always seem fair or good or particularly attractive, especially when we are anxious. There is always something to be thankful for. We can always thank God for the gift of his Son, that we are now reconciled to God by Jesus' death and resurrection, that the Spirit now leads us. We can thank God for past blessings. We can thank God for the breath of life. With a little thought God has given and still gives us much for which to be thankful.

> Now we are here, we have sat in silence and adoration, lifted our request to God with thanksgiving. What can we expect; one thing – yes, one thing. The one thing is, that "the peace of God which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus. We are not promised that every wish is fulfilled, no matter how sincere we may hope. We are promised peace beyond all understanding. Many a great Christian in the face of hardship and loss has discovered that strangely this is true. God gives a deep peace that no human can fathom.

I offer you this simple way of beginning to pray. To sit in silence before our awesome God, to adore and praise Him, to place your needs and others before him with thanksgiving, and receive the deep and inexplicable peace that only our Holy God can give.

Reformation Sunday is the Sunday before Reformation Day (October 31), when Martin Luther posted his <u>95 theses</u> on the church door in Wittenberg. The tradition of Reformation Sunday

offers an opportunity to celebrate our heritage and history, to affirm our central theological convictions and to consider God's ongoing reformation of the church. This year "Reformation Sunday" is celebrated on October 29th and marks 500 years since Martin Luther's first proclamation.



In early Christian tradition, saints' days began as a way to mark the anniversary of a martyr's death — his or her "birthday" as a saint. By the middle of the church's first millennium, there were so many martyrs that it was hard to give them all their due. All Saints' Day was established as an opportunity to honor all the saints, known and unknown.

All Saints' Day has a rather different focus in the Reformed tradition. While we may give thanks for the lives of particular luminaries of ages past, the emphasis is on the ongoing sanctification of the *whole* people of God.

Rather than putting saints on pedestals as holy people set apart in glory, we give glory to God for the ordinary, holy lives of the believers in this and every age. This is an appropriate time to give thanks to members of the community of faith who have died in the past year. We also pray that we may be counted among the company of the faithful in God's eternal realm.

Poke Run members who have passed since the last commemoration, will be remembered on Sunday, November 5th.


