Someone, I believe it was Mark Twain, or perhaps someone like Mark Twin, quipped

that Christianity requires one to believe ten, more or less, impossible things before breakfast. This person was, if we can peer into their brain, most likely thinking about miracles and the fantastic events surrounding Jesus' life. Now I admit that miracles and such are challenging to the modern mind. I also realize that a knee jerk answer explaining them will not satisfy a skeptical or inquiring mind. When we are honest we do not always believe our own answers to the tough questions of faith. And so, as we come into the season of Advent we will do some deep thinking about the birth of Jesus, after all, it was miraculous.

Faith today is a struggle. Simple faith is a thing of the past, whatever we may say, unless we are in deep denial. Truth be told, most people who will tell you that they have a simple faith simply have an unexamined faith that will crumble at the first crisis. I am not going to try to prove to you today that Jesus was born of a virgin, although I believe he was. I am going to begin to give you the tools you will need to continue to develop your own robust faith that you will need to guide you through the sea changes of life and culture that surges around us.

Tim Keller, whose thought informs much of this essay, identifies three barriers to faith. They are intellectual, personal, and social. I would add a fourth that I have already mentioned, the rapidly shifting culture that makes it feel like we are roller-skating downhill on marbles. It is a culture that has decided that faith as well as truth is irrelevant, or at least flexible.

Intellectual doubts begin to assault us as we engage the world around us, as we perceive suffering and injustice, as the discoveries of Science seem to contradict everything we have been taught, and as the unfairness of the world overwhelms us.

Personal doubts often follow. Nothing fits and nothing makes sense. This leads to the third barrier, the social one. Everyone needs a group of people with whom to continue the life of faith. People who get their answers from the nature of God as revealed in the Bible. We need to struggle together to live Christian lives, not in a hostile world, so much as an apathetic one, which may be the more difficult. We require fresh insights, challenging questions, and the give and take of loving community to see the richness and fullness of the life of faith.

You must struggle long and hard with your doubts, and with the doubts of your friends, family and neighbors. When you work through them you will have developed a deep and

abiding faith that is life sustaining. You will be able to give real answers to the questions of skeptics and unbelievers, and this includes, sometimes, you yourself. There is nothing quite like having wrestled with a question for a long time and come to a rock solid answer that is both spiritually and intellectually satisfying. It is the examination of our doubts that ultimately leads to unshakable beliefs and a lived faith.

Here is something that is often missed. We must ask the same honesty of our skeptical or apathetic friends. When they say blithely, "Oh, God wouldn't do that – or - a loving God would never ... " ask them on what grounds they believe that. Not to trap them but to open them to the reality that they have not really challenged their own assumptions. This takes both care and caring. We really do want people to know the truth for Jesus is the way the truth and the life and the truth shall set you free.

To give a very picky example, we don't really know that the "Big Bang" occurred. We only know what happened after the Big Bang, if it occurred at all. No, we don't really know that, we only know that we can explain what we see, to a limited degree, by claiming that an event like the Big Bang must have or could have occurred. We don't really know. We weren't there. No one living was. And, to be truly scientific, it is not a repeatable event, we cannot test it by experiment, and it is not falsifiable. This makes it pretty much speculation and those who hold to a Big Bang theory hold it in, quess what, faith.

I am going to close with a direct quote from Tim Keller that I believe sums this up. I also believe that you and I need to think long and hard about all this because the consequences are eternal.

"Some will respond to all this, "My doubts are not based on a leap of faith. I have no beliefs about God one way or another. I simply feel no need for God and I am not interested in thinking about it." But hidden beneath this feeling is the very modern American belief that the existence of God is a matter of indifference unless it intersects with my emotional needs. The speaker is betting his or her life that no God exists who would hold you accountable for your beliefs or behavior if you didn't feel the need for him. That may be true or again it may not be true, but, again, it is quite a leap of faith."

I am not willing to live my life on such a bet and I hope you are not either.



What is a "Narthex" anyway? We say very often, "More information can be found in the Narthex of the church." But what and where is the Narthex anyway? Well, the Wikipedia definition is: "narthex (Medieval Latin from Classical Greek narthex νάρθηξ" giant fennel, scourge") and was the place for penitents. In Modern Greek narthekas (νάρθηκας) no longer has this meaning and is either the porch of a church, as English, or the brace of a sprained wrist or sling of a broken arm. " Interesting, especially that sprained arm part, don't you think? Here at Poke Run, the Narthex is the room or area just inside the front door of the church before you enter the sanctuary. Poke Run's Narthex was part of building improvements made in 1971—see the below excerpt from our "History Book": **History Books are still available—contact the office if you would like to purchase one.**

center of the nave. A big pew section flanked these center seats on both the left and right. This arrangement necessitated two middle aisles and two side aisles. Front corners on the first few pews were mitered.

These old seats had remained in service for over pinety years.

A roomy exterior narthex was constructed on the front of the church. It added convenient coat rack areas, and places to distribute envelopes, bulletins, and church materials. Also the narthex with a large exterior door prevented outside doors from opening directly into the Sanctuary. Heat conservation during winter resulted, and cold blasts of air did not strike worshippers already seated.
